A sponsor is an individual or organization that pays some or all of the costs involved in staging a sporting or artistic event in return for advertising. Sponsorships are different from donations as the sponsor will receive advertisement and exposure in return.

SPONSORSHIP PROSPECTUS

The [District Convention Sponsorship Prospectus](#) is an advertisement resource used to attract and inform potential sponsors. The prospectus includes information regarding DCON, why you should sponsor, and the history of CNH Key Club and Kiwanis. It also elaborates on payment instructions and the seven sponsorship levels to choose from.

KIWIN'S is the second Kiwanis Family SLP for high school students! In **1974**, Past CNH District Governor **Sid Smith** wanted his daughters to be able to join a service organization. Key Club was the only one at the time, but they weren't able to join as Key Club was originally an **all-male** club. Smith wanted his daughters to have the same opportunities as men so he started a club called "**Keyettes**"

Both Key Club and KIWIN's are now no longer gender specific. In **1995**, the name of the club was later changed to **KIWIN'S** to dispel gender-specific connotations and promote growth.

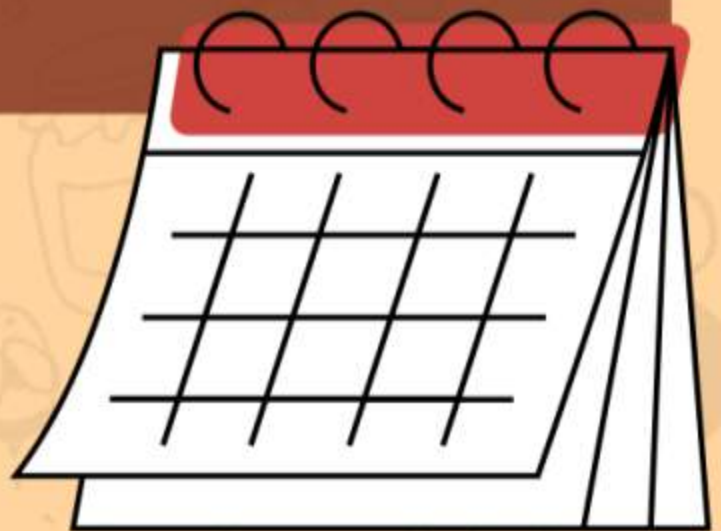

YOUTH OPPORTUNITIES FUND (YOF)?

The Youth Opportunities Fund, funded by the Kiwanis Children Fund, is a \$250-\$2,000 grant provided by Key Club International. It assists clubs in good standing with organizing larger service projects that meet the following criteria:

- Have Key Club member engagement
- Address a need in the community
- Support activities in at least one KCF cause area

OPPORTUNITIES FUND

STEPS TO *apply*

1. Plan a **service project** and create a **balanced budget** (many clubs collaborate with outside organizations to plan projects).
2. Complete a **community-needs assessment** to evaluate the project's strengths and weaknesses.
3. Submit an online application BEFORE the two cycle application deadlines (**Oct 15th & Mar 1st**).
4. Wait for **application reviewal** and decisions by the KCI Board (~ one month).
5. Clubs that receive grants must submit a **report** within a year to qualify for future applications!

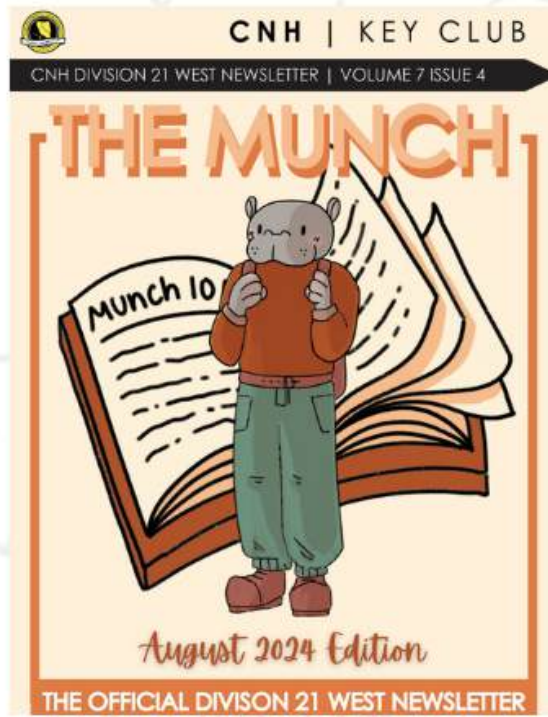

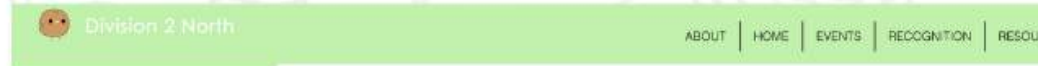
