We've made it to December! While it may not mean all that much change for the weather in sunny Socal, I'm at least hoping for some rain and cooler weather!

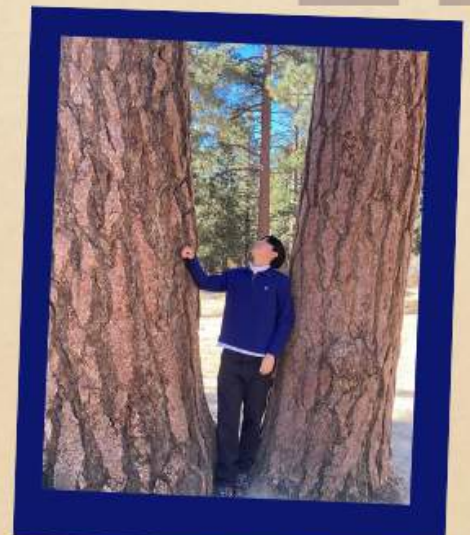

PTP GRANT

The PTP Grant is available as financial assistance to provide trauma care for children as a result of injury or abuse. Funds are available for...



PTP Grant will provide grants to assist Kiwanis and SLP clubs by financing service projects that seek to prevent and/or treat pediatric trauma. Pediatric trauma is defined as serious and life-threatening injuries to children. Up to \$500 may be requested by SLP clubs and funding must be spent within 12 months of receiving.

Through this checklist, the Member Recognition committee hopes to assist clubs, who want to be recognized as a Distinguished and Diamond Distinguished club, build a plan for the term. This checklist is intended to show what it will take for clubs to acquire desired AAR scores and thus uses hypothetical values rather than actual values (the actual calculation is done in the MRF).</p> |

Candidate Requirements

To run for Lieutenant Governor, you must:

- Be a dues paid member
- Complete the Intent to Run and Service Agreement forms with Candidate Training Conference!
- Submit your 2-sided literature (PDF) to your current Lieutenant Governor. If you do so will prohibit you from running, so BEE timely!

Election Procedure

Prior to Conclave (the day of the election), candidates will attend a main speech and an additional 2-3 minute speech (if there are more than one candidates to their LTG, and prepare for a caucus Q&A session.

During the election, delegates will cast a anonymous ballots and elect the candidates, a Nominating Conference will be held, where the first round candidates will then present their final speech, and another round
